

Saint Aidan's in the 1960s





The school was opened in 1963 almost a year after the foundation stones had been laid by Mrs K.H. Elleston in May 1962. The Dedication Service was held on 29th October 1963 and conducted by the Bishop of Blackburn (Dr C.R. Claxton).





The school was

named Saint Aidan's since this saint was principally responsible for bringing Christianity to the North of England.

Founding members of the school included Mr Pierse, Miss Bennett and Mr Ingram. When the school opened there were 12 staff, one secretary, one caretaker and 169 pupils. The pupils were placed in one of four houses: Shaftesbury, Grenfell, Temple and Livingstone.

Costing over £100,000 to build, it was called the 'school with a view' because of the beautiful panoramic scenery from the school buildings.



The first school trip was held in 1964 and was to Ireland. The trip was for third and fourth years (Years 9 and 10). Not long after, first and second years (Years 7 and 8) also went on the same trip.



Summer 1964

The first summer fair was opened in 1964 by Jimmy Armfield, who at the time was captain of Blackpool FC. The event attracted over 700 people and was organised by teachers and parents to raise money for stage scenery, reading desks and a cine projector. The event raised £170.



December 1964

The school's first performance was the 'Christmas Kaleidoscope', where students performed *The Nativity* story.



Summer 1969

A team of staff and students built the sports pavilion on the school fields. It cost approximately £500.


Saint Aidan's in the 1970s

The 1970s saw many changes in the education system as well as at Saint Aidan's. The school grew in size as the leaving age was increased to 16 and new buildings were created to accommodate the rising numbers on roll. Technological steps were taken as the first computer was introduced in school.



In September 1976, the school changed from being a secondary modern to a comprehensive, welcoming pupils of all abilities and affording them the possibilities of reaching their full potential. Saint Aidan's led the way and was the first school in the district to make this change. There were 520 students on roll at the time and 32 members of staff, four of whom were on the original staff when the school opened in 1963.

To facilitate this change and increase in numbers, Saint Aidan's was one of only two schools in Lancashire to benefit from a brick built ROSLA block, others were built of a less robust construction. There were many new buildings opened during this decade including the Askwith Wing, Lancaster Wing and Ingram Wing.















1970

St. Oswald's - Preesall

Friday, 29th May, 1970

Founder member of the school, George Ingram sadly passed away on 23rd May 1970. His funeral was held at St Oswald's in Preesall and attended by many staff and students.

To recognise the dedication and contribution he made to the school, a new building was named after him and opened in 1976.

Changes in the 5th Year uniform

During this decade the 5th years' school uniform changed each year as the senior girls chose the uniform they wished to have.

1970-71: green kilts, white blouse, red jumpers 1971-72: purple dresses (some of these were made in needlework lessons)

1972-73: navy suits with a pink or white blouse 1973-74: red skirt with navy tank top and white blouse

1974-75: navy blue skirt, red jumper and a white blouse

1975-76: brown skirts and green jumpers 1976-77: green skirts, cream blouses and a green jumper

1977-87: brown skirt, cream blouse and brown jumper. This remained the 5th years' uniform until1987-88, the Silver Jubilee year.

In the 1980s, the school saw a lot of change. New started and Silver celebrated our Jubilee.

Many events took place to celebrate the school's 25 years educating the students of Over Wyre. A commemorative book, marking the school's changes and parishes, was produced and given to all students. The school jumper changed to silver to reflect the celebration year. Not only that but 25 roses, which still bloom today, were planted near the Nancy Poole Art Suite and the pantomime "Aladdin" was performed, along with a Passion Play at Easter.

The whole school also participated in a Pilgrimage travelling to Lindisfarne. Holy Island in Northumberland founded by Irish Monk Saint Aidan. On Saturday 7th May 1988, a special train was chartered for all staff and students.

During this decade trips were made to Hothersall Lodge and Tower Wood and a bit further afield to Israel.

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In Mr Pierce's place arrived Dr Leeson. Many things changed with the arrival of a new head teacher, most notably the Year 11 uniforms. These became what current Year 11 now wear. The house names also changed from Grenfell, Livingstone, Shaftesbury and Temple to Baggage, Hillary, Keller and Nightingale.

The school was awarded Technology College status in 1994, one of the first school to do so. With the award, the school's name changed from Saint Aidan's Church of England Voluntary Aided High School to Saint Aidan's Church of England Technology College.


